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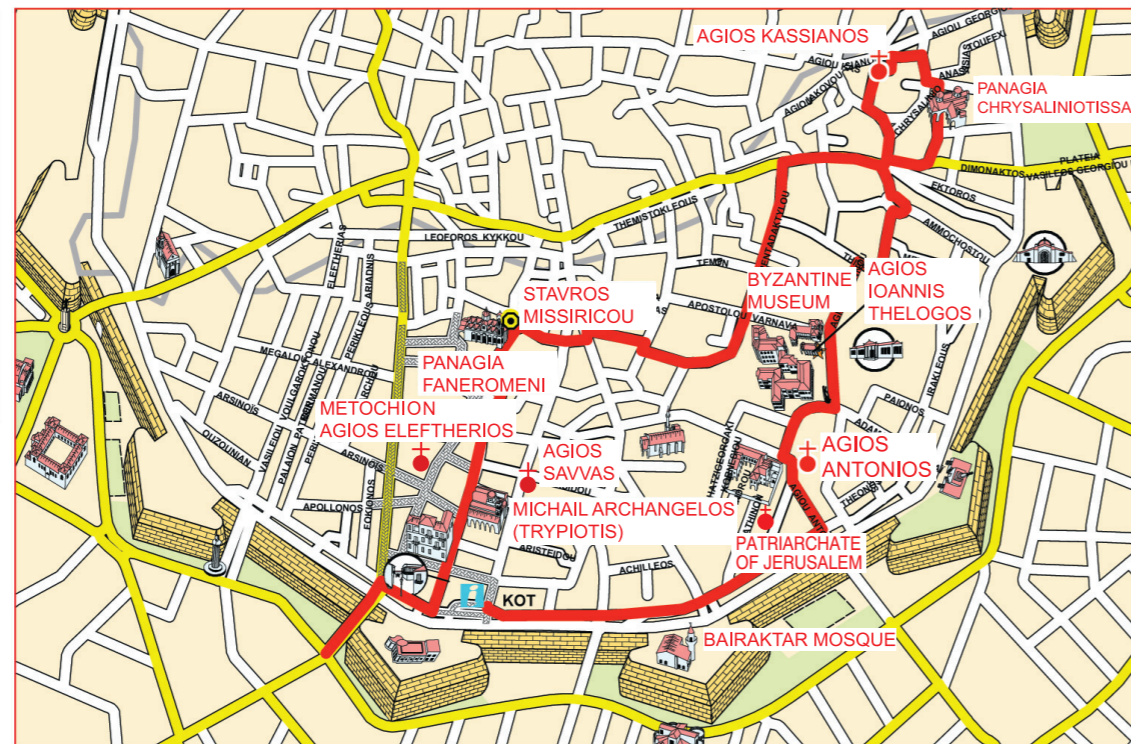

 **Agios Ioannis Theologos Cathedral**

The Agios Ioannis Cathedral is situated in the centre of Old Nicosia, between the old and the new Archbishopric palaces and opposite the Pancyprian Gymnasium. The cathedral was built circa 1662 – 1663 by Archbishop Nikiphoros. It has a single nave, a steeply pitched roof and a narthex on the west side built by Archbishop Chrysanthos in 1779. The Agios Ioannis Theologos Cathedral is the only church from the Ottoman period, the interior of which, is completely covered with frescoes that date back to 18th and 19th century. The woodcarved iconostasis of the church is one of the most beautiful of its kind in Cyprus and was created during 18th century. The cathedral was built on the site of the Agios Ioannis Tou Pipi Monastery. It was founded during the Byzantine period, most probably in the 11th century and was in full operation until the 17th century. In the beginning of the 18th century the Archbishop established his authorities in the premises and from then on it became the seat of the Archbishops of Cyprus.

 **Byzantine Museum, Archbishop Makarios III Foundation**

The Byzantine Museum is situated in the courtyard of the Agios Ioannis Theologos Cathedral and is considered as the most prominent religious art museum in Cyprus. There is a collection of important icons from the 8th to 19th century, detached frescoes and some parts from mosaics of the Panagia Kanakaria Church dating back to from 6th century and frescoes from the Agios Euphemianos Church in Lysi, detached by the Turkish illegal antiques dealers after 1974 and later brought back to Cyprus.

 **Panagia Chrysaliniotissa Church**

The most important Byzantine church in Nicosia and the only one in the medieval town that can be dated back to the middle – Byzantine period. The original church was barrel – vaulted with a dome, but in the following years underwent many interventions that changed the original shape. A lot of important icons from The Panagia Chrysaliniotissa Church are exhibited in the Byzantine Museum Archbishop Makarios III Foundation.

 **Agios Cassianos Church**

The Agios Cassianos Church is situated near the Panagia Chrysaliniotissa Church, and its present form consists of two naves and a steeply pitched roof. According to the epigraph it was built in 1854 on the site of a previously existing church. Many important icons from that church are exhibited in the Byzantine Museum Archbishop Makarios III Foundation.

 **Agios Savvas Church**

The Agios Savvas Church is an old temple enhanced and modified during the centuries. The earliest historical evidence shows the church was renovated in 1781 and previously in 1608, according to the epigraph. The memorial plaque on the western side of the church states the church was built in 1851. The wood carved iconostasis was made in 1801 and extended in 1870 prior to the building of a second altar, similar to the Agios Cassianos Church. The Agios Savvas Church keeps two treasures: The Holy Cross from the old iconostasis dated from 1659, a work of Pavlos the Hagiographer, and a golden Chalice dated from 1596.

 **Panagia Phaneromeni Church**

The Panagia Phaneromeni Church was built in 1792 on the site of a convent of the same name which formerly existed under the Venetian rule but its founding probably dates to the Middle Byzantine period. To the east of the temple stands the marble mausoleum of the national heroes and martyrs Archbishop Kyprianos, the bishops and priests executed by the Ottomans in 1821.

 **Holy Cross of Missirikou Church**

The Holy Cross of Missirikou Church is located east of Phaneromeni. This is a small church which dates back the Venetian period i.e. the first half of the 16th century. During the Ottoman period the church was turned into a mosque and named Araplars Mosque (‘Mosque of the Arabs’). The church has three naves with a dome, but no frescoes survived.

 **Agios Antonios Church**

The Agios Antonios Church is located in the center of the old town of Nicosia, within close distance from the Archbishopric, the Agios Ioannis Theologos Cathedral and the Mansion of Dragoman Hadjigeorgakis Kornesios. The church dates back to 18th century and belongs to the architectural model of single roomed and tile roofed churches built during the Ottoman period. Especially valuable are the wood carved iconostasis and the masterly stone carved bell tower of the church.

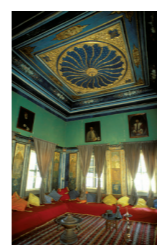

 **Archangelos Michail Tripiotis Church**

The Archangelos Michail Tripiotis Church is a three-domed basilica that has almost square plan. It is built using smooth porous stones. The architectural style is typical of the churches from the second half of the 16th century i.e. Venetian period, such as the Agios Neophytos Monastery's cathedral in Paphos, the churches of Agia Ekatherina in Kritou Tera and Agios Mamas in Morphou. According to the inscription on the east of the south entrance the Agios Michail Tripiotis church was built on donation by Priest Iakovos and the Christian parishioners in 1695 during the Ottoman period. The construction of the church hints for some large scaled repairs or additions to the existing church of the 16th century. If the inscription is accurate the architectural pattern of the church is unique and unusual for the Ottoman period. It is probable the church was built on the site of an Orthodox monastery the only remains of which is the church. A very valuable icon influenced by 15th century Italian art is kept in the church alongside some others from the Ottoman period.
